

Abundant Love, Amazing Grace: Love Anyway

February 25, 2024 Scripture: John 13:34-35

Love is patient. Love is kind. Love does not envy. Love does not boast. Love is not proud. This key scripture, found in the book of 1 Corinthians, seems to leave out one key fact. Love is hard.

In the book of John, during the Last Supper, Jesus tells us that we are to love one another. Not those we like, not those with whom we always get along, not those who look or talk or act like us. Jesus doesn't say "Love the people you want to love." Jesus tells us to love one another. It's a simple suggestion, yet one we struggle with so greatly, because love is hard.

We are not perfect human beings. We are flawed. We make mistakes. We are bound to slip up in our journey to truly loving our neighbor. So what should we do when we encounter an individual who is particularly difficult to love? Should we ignore them? Should we avoid them? No, we should love them anyway.


At Camp Alkulana, we end each day with a staff meeting to discuss hiccups during the day and information we think is important for all of the staff to know. One night, we began to discuss a particularly difficult camper. This camper was creating lots of issues for the staff, and the majority of the counselors were feeling the frustration of trying to work with this particular child. As we lamented how hard it was to love him, our boss gently informed us of some details of his life outside of camp, and how he probably didn't know how to accept our love because he wasn't used to receiving it.

In that moment, it was clear that we needed to love anyway. No matter how hard it was for us, no matter the strain it put on our day, that child needed the love we had to offer. So, this week, when you encounter someone who is difficult to love, don't avoid them or ignore them.

Love them anyway.

Abundant Love, Amazing Grace: Why I Observe Lent

March 3, 2024

"For the message of the cross is foolishness to those who are perishing, but to us who are being saved it is the power of God." - 1 Cor. 1:18

I grew up in a Baptist tradition that did not observe Lent. For us the high holy days were Christmas, Easter, Mother's Day and Father's Day. Lent was something we left to the Catholics. Ashes on the forehead and "giving up things" for Lent were foreign to us and not part of our tradition. However, as my Christian journey has progressed, I have come to appreciate how the observance of the 40-day period called Lent can deepen my faith. Lent culminates with Holy Week, beginning the Sunday before Easter and going up to Easter Sunday, that great day of celebrating our Lord's resurrection. Observing Lent adds to the celebration.

Like most Christians around the world observing the Lenten season encourages me to spend time in introspection, self-examination, and repentance. But, beyond the inward looking that Lent requires, today's selected scripture (1 Cor. 1:18) reminds me to also remember the central message of the Gospel as I journey through Lent; "the message of the Cross." You can't get to Easter without going through the cross.

But what is the "message of the cross"? Paul says that "to us who are being saved it is the power of God." The message of the cross is that Christ died for you and for me. He died in our place. He took the punishment our sins deserved and secured for us eternal life. Without the message of the cross, says theologian Reinhold Niebuhr, we end up with "a view that insists on a God without wrath bringing men and women without sin into a kingdom without judgment through a Christ without a cross."


The message of the cross also says that God comes along side of us when we suffer. The German theologian, Dietrich Bonhoeffer, who was executed for resisting Hitler and the Nazis, was right when he said "Only a suffering God can help." The cross is proof that God suffers with us.

One of my favorite preachers, Fred Craddock, explains it this way. "Sometimes a child falls down and skins a knee or an elbow, then runs crying to his mother. The mother picks up the child and says, 'Let me kiss it and make it better,' as if mother has magic saliva or something. She picks up the child, kisses the skinned place, holds the child in her lap, and all is well. Did her kiss make it well? No, no. It was that ten minutes in her lap. Just sit in the lap of love and see the mother crying. 'Mother, why are you crying? I'm the one who hurt my elbow.' 'Because you hurt,' the mother says, 'I hurt.'

That is the message of the cross and why I observe Lent.

The message of the cross is that the Son of God was crucified to atone for the sins of mankind and secure pardon and salvation for all who would believe in Him.

March 10, 2024





March 24, 2024




